

The Davey Jones' Locker Challenge

The 2010 Davey Jones' Locker Challenge is taking place on Saturday, April 17, 2010 at West Mesa Aquatic Center. Dive times are available between the hours of 7am-12pm.

Divers work together in a team of 5 to assemble a giant metal puzzle in a relaxed, fun underwater setting. Puzzles are 40 sq. feet each. Dive time is 45 minutes.

The entry fee is \$75/person or \$375/team. You can raise money by asking friends, family, neighbors and coworkers to sponsor you. If you asked just 3 people to sponsor \$25 then you have your entry fee met! Entry fee is due by day of event.

In order to participate in the event you will need a signed waiver and valid certification cards (for insurance purposes, divers without proof of certification will not be allowed to dive). New Mexico Scuba Center is providing your tanks and weights.

Once you turn in your entry form, you will be given a dive time. Please show up 30 minutes prior to your dive time. You will have exactly 45 minutes to put together as much of the puzzle as you can.

***Don't worry if you don't have the 5 divers to make a team!**

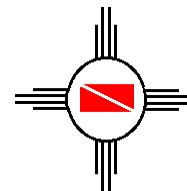

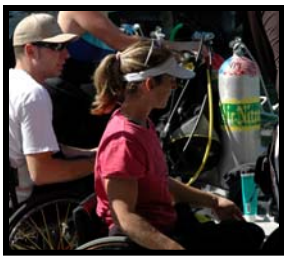

Dive Pirates derives its name and philosophy from the combination of diving adventure and the romance of the Caribbean, especially the panache of pirates. Traditionally, pirate crews would take care of injured crew members by making them peg legs, hooks, eye patches, etc. Disabled crew members were not banished from the ship, but were given new tasks that they could perform and be useful to the rest of the crew. They were also given a pre-determined cut of the booty in exchange for their contribution. Dive Pirates continues that spirit by bringing the Adaptive Divers along with the rest of the crew and cutting them in on the priceless booty of Scuba Diving in the Caribbean.



Adaptive Scuba is a training philosophy that addresses the specific needs of a disabled individual, trains to

that specific disability, and then prepares that individual to dive with mainstream Open Water Divers. We do this by including as many standard skills as possible and by jointly training with an Adaptive Buddy that can fill in the gaps for the disabled diver. These divers are a team that can dive in most locations with Open Water Divers.

Adaptive Divers are usually those with spinal cord injuries (paraplegic), neurological disorders, or amputations. For those divers that are quadriplegic or blind, we train them as Escorted Divers that require a team of 3 other divers to dive safely. Both Adaptive and Escorted Divers can dive in the mainstream diving community.

Dive Pirates' Adaptive Scuba program is managed under the auspices of Scuba Schools International. The training program for instructors was created by SSI Course Director, Stacey Minton, in 2001. Open Water Divers or Dive Leaders from other agencies that wish to learn to work with Adaptive Divers or become Specialty Instructors are welcome to become trained and join our crew.



Our Mission: Based on camaraderie, compassion, freedom to dive, and the Code of Conduct, Dive Pirates will support, train, equip, and provide dive travel to individuals with disabilities through Adaptive Scuba Diving.

New Mexico Scuba Center is a local chapter of the Dive Pirates Foundation and has been since 2003. The goal of the Davey Jones' Locker Challenge is to raise \$7500 to support, train, equip and provide open water certification for adaptive divers in the New Mexico area.

Dive Pirates has planned their 6th Annual Dive Trip for Cayman Brac on June 19-26, 2010. We are raising funds to be able to take at least 2 adaptive divers, new to this sport, on this trip. These funds will be used to train, equip them with gear, and to take them to Cayman Brac to obtain their open water certification. Our goal is to instill a love of the sport that will last a lifetime.

It isn't an adventure of a lifetime, it is a lifetime of adventure



Equipment Needed for the Challenge:

- Divers must bring gear (New Mexico Scuba will furnish your tank and weights)
- It is advisable that you have gloves (the edges around the puzzle may be sharp)

Divers **MUST** bring their certification cards and sign a waiver to participate.
